Annie McCully

Belmont Care Home 3rd February 2015 (died 28th January 2015)

Annie McCully, passed away at quarter to seven on Wednesday evening, 28th January, in the Ulster Hospital at Dundonald. It was a shock to everyone, because despite her age, Annie hadn't looked or sounded like she would be leaving us all so soon. This reserved little lady was all of 93 years old, having been born on 23 November 1922. Annie was a very private person, quiet, gentle and unassuming.

As many of you will know, she was born and bred in the Pass. Like her sister Sadie, she regularly attended services in St Mary Magdalene Church and took part in all the leisure activities of the area. Barn dance or ballroom dancing, Annie was in her element.

Annie was a seamstress for years. But she also worked in the Printing Trade – firstly for 18 years in Melbourne and latterly in WG Baird's, upon her return. Annie was an intelligent woman with many skills, thoughtful and quiet, fond of crosswords and reading

When not working or dancing, Annie loved nothing more than getting in her own wee car and going for a drive, perhaps down to the caravan in Newcastle, perhaps further afield. Blackpool was a favourite spot for a holiday. I'm sure there would have been a bit of dancing there too!

Well, Annie has left us. Only six weeks after Sadie. It's a very difficult time for everyone. The timing of anyone's passing is out of our hands. We're never ready for it. Part of the pain of bereavement is the sheer unexpectedness of it all.

Annie's passing has been without fuss. She wouldn't have liked any fuss. In a way, she has just decided to leave the dance floor and to slip out unnoticed into the shadows. Her breathing difficulties are now a thing of the past.

She will be greatly missed by her surviving sister Minnie, niece Stella Spackman, nephew Tommy Dickson and the wider family circle, as well as those who remember Annie and her family amongst our parishioners, a number of whom attended the funeral service at Roselawn on 3rd February.

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The Rector writes . . .

Dear Parishioners

In the calendar year we have reached the month of March. A lot happens in March. As I wrote in the February magazine, we associate February with Lent. Following the lunar calendar, Ash Wednesday can be as early as 6th February or as late as the 9th March. In any case it always continues into March, since the 'forty days' of Lent run for six weeks or so. As you recall Sundays are not counted as part of Lent and Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday is the 40th and last day of Lent. If you are fasting, remember you can have Sundays off. They are days of rejoicing and remind us of Jesus' resurrection on a Sunday.

I hope to see as many of you as possible both at our Lenten Lunch [8th March – 16 days into Lent] and at our St Patrick's Day Service and lunch [24th day of Lent]. Sandwiched in between the two saints – David on 1st March and Patrick on 17th March we also celebrate the Mothering Sunday on 15th March. On that occasion many families will be going out to lunch! Traditionally, this was a day when children, mainly daughters, who had gone to work as domestic servants were given a day off to visit their mother and family.

But it is also used in the sense of 'Mother Church'. Centuries ago it was considered important for people to return to the Mother Church' [usually the Cathedral] once a year. This return to the 'Mother Church' then became the occasion for family reunions, when children who were working away from home returned home. It was quite common in those days for children to leave home for work once they were ten years old. As they walked along the country lanes, children would pick wild flowers or violets to take to church or give to their mother as a small gift.

The food item specially associated with Mothering Sunday is the Simnel Cake. As I am sure you know this is a fruit cake with two layers of almond paste, one on top and one in the middle. It is also made with 11 balls of marzipan icing on top representing the 11 disciples [Judas is not included]. Traditionally, sugar violets would also be added. The name 'Simnel' probably comes from the Latin word 'simila' which means a fine wheat flour, usually used for baking a cake. There is even a funny story about a man called Simon and his wife Nell who argued over whether the cake for Mothering Sunday should be baked or boiled. In the end they did both, so the cake was named after both of them – Sim – Nel.

Two more Sundays further on and we come to Palm Sunday which leads us on to the events of what we now call Holy Week. I would encourage you to work your way through at least one Gospel during Lent, and perhaps another one in Holy Week itself. The lectionary gospel we are using at the moment is St Mark and I will be addressing the Markan account of the Resurrection on Easter Sunday. It is

the shortest Gospel – 16 chapters or 20 pages – so that it would be a joy to read it quietly through again during Lent or Holy Week.

Any of the four Gospels will suit admirably. During the three services in Holy Week this year I will be preaching on Jesus' 'Seven last words from the cross', which are drawn from three of the Gospels:

- 1. 'Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing.' [Luke 23: 34]; [Monday]
- 2. 'Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise.' [Luke 23: 43]; [Monday]
- 3. 'Woman, here is your son'... 'Here is your mother'. [John 19: 26-27]; [Maundy Thursday]
- 4. 'Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?' which means, 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' [Mark 15: 34]; [Maundy Thursday]
- 5. 'I am thirsty' [John 19: 28]; [Good Friday]
- 6. 'It is finished' [John 19: 30]; [Good Friday]
- 7. 'Father, into your hands I commend my spirit.' [Luke 23: 46] [Good Friday]

Please try to come along on the Monday, Thursday and Good Friday evenings! In addition, we have had the exciting offer by the Church of Ireland Chaplaincy at Queen's University to come down to us during Holy Week, particularly to minister to the young people and children of Donegall Pass. We should pray that the Holy Spirit will be at work during this period of Youth Outreach. If there is anything else involving the students and the chaplaincy team which you might like to attend it will be announced. Planning for that is just beginning. A blessed and Happy Easter to all of you and your families.
