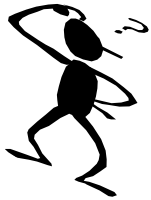

### St MARTIN DE PORRES

Martin was born in 1579 in Lima, Peru, the son of a former slave. He grew up in poverty and was taken in by a religious order as a servant boy. The monks looked down on Martin because he was mixed-race but in time his behaviour led to the Dominican Order stopping their racial limits on admission and he was made a full brother. He worked tirelessly on behalf of the poor starting an orphanage and a children's hospital.

During his lifetime he was seen in other places. An African slave said Martin came to comfort him and many others. When the same man later saw him in Peru, he was very happy to meet him again and asked Martin if he had had a good voyage; but Martin had never left Lima.

In pictures, Martin de Porres is shown as a young man with a broom, since he thought all work sacred, no matter how lowly. He is also shown with a dog, cat and mouse, all eating in peace from the one dish.

The Rector writes ...

Dear Parishioners

We have had a busy period in church recently, with a number of special services which have required a lot of time, thought, prayer and preparation for a great number of people in our congregation. If you were able to attend either the morning or evening Harvest Thanksgiving Services, or the Trafalgar Day Service I trust that you found them helpful and uplifting. Many thanks to the choir and organist for all their contributions, to those who decorated the Church for Harvest, to those who distributed fruit and flowers around the congregation, to those who set up for the Harvest Supper, prepared or served food, washed dishes or did any of the many essential jobs that make such occasions so successful. We are all in your debt and the result was a resounding success on all fronts – from musical, culinary and social points of view.

There is no slackening of pace as we race towards November, with Christmas in our sights. Before then we have the pleasure of the second visit of the Royal Naval Association, who will be joining us again for Remembrance Sunday, as we recall the sacrifices of those who have given their lives so willingly to protect our cherished values and way of life. Next year will of course see two important anniversaries: the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War, as well as the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day, a pivotal point in the Second World War. Thereafter, anniversaries of conflicts come thick and fast, as key events in both World Wars are recalled between 2015 and 2019. All this against the back-drop of tensions in many countries, particularly in North Africa and the Middle East, as well as the staged withdrawal of troops from Afghanistan in 2014.

At the same time as we recall the past, so too we must address the needs of the present and plan for the future. Whilst we are rightly proud of our Church of Ireland traditions, including the dignity of the wording in our Book of Common Prayer, our Anglican canticles and psalms, as well as the many great hymns in our hymn book, many of which we have inherited from previous generations, we must not neglect the need to respond with creativity and flexibility to the culture in which we live. That culture is often much more informal, is fascinated by the use of modern technologies, is more mobile and spontaneous, used to being offered choices, invited to express its opinions on a whole range of matters. We live in the age of Facebook, blogging, twitter, and Youtube and we need to see these and other features of modern culture as opportunities rather than threats. If we cling on to old ways of doing things we will find that the culture around us ignores us or that we do not register with them.

The same applies to the style of service we offer. On Sundays we currently provide a traditional diet of Holy Communion and Morning Prayer services, supplemented by a range of special services for Harvest, Remembrance, Trafalgar Day and suchlike. These are well regarded by our regular congregation and cater for the needs of most of us, at least most of the time. These services are supplemented by a short informal service on Thursdays, currently attended by a few faithful

parishioners. I believe that there is space in the suite of services we currently offer for an element which is already on offer in many other churches. It usually goes under the label of 'All-age worship' or 'Family Service', as a means of appealing to a wider age-group and enabling the extended family to worship together. This is what I have in mind for St Mary Magdalene.

Some of you might wonder at the need for such a service in our church, with its age profile tilted most clearly to the senior end of the age spectrum. You may be right that there is no demand for such a service. Time will tell. It is though something of a chicken and egg case! Children and young people don't come to our services because there aren't any of them around, or there aren't any around because we don't provide the type of service they find more appealing. Either they are going elsewhere or they are going nowhere! If we continue just doing what we have always done there will – in time – be no-one to attend! I am a great believer in the adage: 'If you are standing still you are actually moving backwards'. In schools this is certainly true and in churches also.

In the light of this preamble, we will be having the first one of a new type of service on Sunday 17th November. We intend to run these on a regular basis thereafter. The Sunday they fall on may vary, so please check the magazine and other publicity for the details. There will be none in December because of two Carol services and a BB service. We will let you know in the December magazine when the January W.O.W. Service will take place. The letters stand for 'Ways Of Worship' and there is a dual purpose to their choice. This service will be a kind of liturgical workshop, where we can experiment with different styles of worship, different styles of music, different structures. It will be thematically driven, so that each service will have its own overarching theme to bind the different elements together. The fact that the letters produce the word 'wow'! is clearly deliberate, in that it goes back to a sermon where I referred to a way of praying in a balanced fashion: **Wow**=things God does/ has done that fill us with wonder and awe; **Thanks**=things in our lives for which to thank God; **Sorry** = things we have thought, said or done which have harmed our relationships with God and others; **Please**=things with which we need God's help, including illness and major life challenges, the state of the world etc. I would like these to be joyful and lively services, but they will have space for peace, prayerfulness and learning together.

I find this an exciting prospect, and one that is daunting at the same time. The open-endedness of the format will mean that I will have to come up with a theme and a way of tackling it each time, as well as devising the most helpful ways of doing so. I do believe that the Holy Spirit is urging us to take this risk at this time for the good of the spiritual health of his people and the extension of his kingdom. I hope that, in time, we will encourage children and young people to contribute to such a service, using their gifts in drama, music and much else besides. I would appreciate any offers to be involved in this creative venture – please phone or email! Above all, I would ask for your prayers that God may be in this from the outset and that he will draw people to this form of worship, for the spiritual benefit of all. Please encourage your children and grandchildren and other relatives to come along on November 17<sup>th</sup> and on other Sundays when we can explore the W.O.W. factor together.
